Biographical Note

Eminent curator Nick Waterlow described Carl Plate's work as 'quite unlike any other artist of his generation ... forged in abstraction with at times vestiges of Cubism and Abstract Expressionism. ... The unique abstract language he developed combined a European awareness and sensibility with an acute understanding of the psyche of the place he lived.'

"Master of the abstract", "arresting and original", "unfailing imagination" are some of the appraisals given by critics. James Gleeson wrote that "there are many abstract painters but only one Carl Plate."

Carl Plate (1909-1977) was born in Perth to a Swedish-German father and an English-born mother, moving to Sydney in 1913. He studied under Raynor Hoff and Fred Leist at East Sydney Technical College (1930-4).

In 1935 he travelled to Europe via Cuba, Mexico and the USA. In London he mixed with many influential artists and writers including Henry Moore, TS Eliot and Herbert Read, and saw the 1936 International Surrealist Exhibition, which altered his view of the world. Carl studied at St Martins School under Vivian Pitchforth and the Central School of Arts and Crafts under Bernard Meninsky in London (1935-40), and travelled to the Soviet Union and Scandinavia. He continued to travel widely throughout his life, primarily to his beloved Paris. In 1940 he brought back works from 32 modern British artists, holding two of the first exhibitions of modern art in Sydney and Melbourne, at his newly-established and influential Notanda Gallery in Sydney's Rowe St, and Myers in Melbourne. In that same year he became an early member and office-bearer of the newly-formed NSW Contemporary Arts Society, then the powerhouse of Sydney modernism. Along with his wife Jocelyn (née Zander) and four children he lived in the bush near Sydney.

As an artist and gallerist he was actively engaged with the Sydney art scene, notably the post WW11 modernist movement. His work was widely exhibited nationally and internationally and is held in the National and all State Galleries, University collections, Art Bank, The Reserve Bank and many private collections.

A 1959 exhibition at London's Leicester Galleries is considered the first solo show of an Australian abstract artist in that city. Carl Plate held another landmark solo show in New York in 1962. His work has been the subject of two exhibitions at the Art Gallery of NSW in 1977 and 2006, followed by a major retrospective at the Hazelhurst Regional Gallery and Arts Centre. Carl Plate: Collage 1938-1976 celebrated his lifelong work as a uniquely talented collage artist, work which developed a new language in both collage and painting.
